Course Objective: his course will introduce students to the theory of music, providing them with the skills needed to read and write Western music notation, as well as to understand, analyze, and listen informedly. Over the course of twelve weeks, we will cover fundamentals of Western music theory, from the absolute basics to some more advanced concepts, such as pitches and scales, intervals, clefs, rhythm, form, meter, phrases and cadences, and basic harmony.
